# PROPOSAL TO AMEND SECTION 6.3 OVERALL GOALS & OBJECTIVES FOR THE MODERATE INCOME HOUSING ELEMENT OF THE PROVIDENCE CITY GENERAL PLAN 2020

#### **Amendment Description:**

Amend the wording of strategies listed in 6.3 of the moderate income housing element of the Providence City General Plan 2020 to be consistent with the requirements of UCA 10-9a-403(2)(b)(iii) and UCA 10-9a-403(2)(c).

#### **Findings of Fact:**

- 1. UCA 10-9a-401. General plan required Content. The city is required to have a general plan for present and future needs of the city and growth and development of all or any part of the land within the City.
- 2. UCA 10-9a-408(1)(e). Specified municipality means a city of the fifth class with a population of 5,000 or more, if the city is located in a county of the third class.
- 3. UCA 10-9a-403(2)(b) requires the planning commission, of a specified city, to include an analysis of how the city will provide a realistic opportunity for the development of moderate income housing within the next five years; and a recommendation to implement three or more of the strategies listed below.
- 4. UCA 10-9a-403(2)(c) Requires the planning commission to establish a timeline for implementing each of the moderate income housing strategies selected by the municipality for implementation.
  - The timeline shall identify specific measures and benchmarks for implementing each moderate income housing strategy selected; and
  - b. Provide flexibility for the city to make adjustments as needed.
- 5. UCA 10-9a-408(2) requires the city to submit a written moderate income housing report to the Housing and Community Development Division within the Department of Workforce Services. The strategies identified in this report must match the phrasing of the strategy as outlined in UCA 10-9a-403(2)(b)(iii).
- 6. UCA 10-9a-408(5) lists the requirements for the city to qualify for priority consideration. To qualify for priority consideration, the city must select 5 or more moderate income strategies.
  - a. Priority consideration allows the Transportation Commission to give priority consideration for projects within the city; and allows the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget to give priority consideration in awarding financial grants under the COVID-19 Local Assistance Matching Grant Program.

#### Conclusions of Law:

- The city has a general plan that was approved by Resolution 004-2020 on April 15, 2020. The 2020 plan
  contains a moderate income housing element. The moderate income housing element includes
  strategies that are phrased similar to the strategies listed in UCA 10-9a-403(2)(c), but do not contain
  the exact language.
- 2. Providence City is a city of the fifth class and Cache County is a county of the third class. Therefore, we are a "specified municipality".
- The planning commission needs to prepare a revision to the current moderate income housing element
  of the Providence City General Plan 2020 that includes, at a minimum, three of the strategies listed
  below.
- 4. The planning commission also needs to include an analysis of realistic opportunities for the development of moderate income housing over the next 5 years.

- As part of the implementation plan, the planning commission needs to include a timeline identifying specific measures and benchmarks for each strategy and be flexible enough for the city to make adjustments when needed.
- 6. To qualify for "priority consideration," five strategies should be recommended.
- 7. The strategies listed in the current moderate income housing element of the 2020 General Plan are attached to this report.
- 8. A draft of proposed strategies using the wording in UCA 10-9a-403(2)(b)(iii), along with a proposed implementation plan and bench marks is attached to this report.

The following is the list of strategy options listed in UCA 10-9a-403(2)(b)(iii).

- (A) rezone for densities necessary to facilitate the production of moderate income housing;
- (B) demonstrate investment in the rehabilitation or expansion of infrastructure that facilitates the construction of moderate income housing;
- (C) demonstrate investment in the rehabilitation of existing uninhabitable housing stock into moderate income housing:
- (D) identify and utilize general fund subsidies or other sources of revenue to waive construction related fees that are otherwise generally imposed by the municipality for the construction or rehabilitation of moderate income housing;
- (E) create or allow for, and reduce regulations related to, internal or detached accessory dwelling units in residential zones;
- (F) zone or rezone for higher density or moderate income residential development in commercial or mixed-use zones near major transit investment corridors, commercial centers, or employment centers;
- (G) amend land use regulations to allow for higher density or new moderate income residential development in commercial or mixed-use zones near major transit investment corridors;
- (H) amend land use regulations to eliminate or reduce parking requirements for residential development where a
  resident is less likely to rely on the resident's own vehicle, such as residential development near major transit
  investment corridors or senior living facilities;
- (I) amend land use regulations to allow for single room occupancy developments;
- (J) implement zoning incentives for moderate income units in new developments;
- (K) preserve existing and new moderate income housing and subsidized units by utilizing a landlord incentive program, providing for deed restricted units through a grant program, or, notwithstanding Section 10-9a-535, establishing a housing loss mitigation fund;
- (L) reduce, waive, or eliminate impact fees related to moderate income housing;
- (M) demonstrate creation of, or participation in, a community land trust program for moderate income housing;
- (N) implement a mortgage assistance program for employees of the municipality, an employer that provides contracted services to the municipality, or any other public employer that operates within the municipality;
- (O) apply for or partner with an entity that applies for state or federal funds or tax incentives to promote the construction of moderate income housing, an entity that applies for programs offered by the Utah Housing Corporation within that agency's funding capacity, an entity that applies for affordable housing programs administered by the Department of Workforce Services, an entity that applies for affordable housing programs administered by an association of governments established by an interlocal agreement under Title 11, Chapter 13, Interlocal Cooperation Act, an entity that applies for services provided by a public housing authority to preserve and create moderate income housing, or any other entity that applies for programs or services that promote the construction or preservation of moderate income housing;
- (P) demonstrate utilization of a moderate income housing set aside from a community reinvestment agency, redevelopment agency, or community development and renewal agency to create or subsidize moderate income housing;
- (Q) create a housing and transit reinvestment zone pursuant to Title 63N, Chapter 3, Part 6, Housing and Transit Reinvestment Zone Act;
- (R) eliminate impact fees for any accessory dwelling unit that is not an internal accessory dwelling unit as defined in Section 10-9a-530;
- (S) create a program to transfer development rights for moderate income housing;
- (T) ratify a joint acquisition agreement with another local political subdivision for the purpose of combining

- resources to acquire property for moderate income housing;
- (U) develop a moderate income housing project for residents who are disabled or 55 years old or older;
- (V) develop and adopt a station area plan in accordance with Section 10-9a-403.1
- (W) create or allow for, and reduce regulations related to, multifamily residential dwellings compatible in scale and form with detached single-family residential dwellings and located in walkable communities within residential or mixed-use zones; and
- (X) demonstrate implementation of any other program or strategy to address the housing needs of residents of the municipality who earn less than 80% of the area median income, including the dedication of a local funding source to moderate income housing or the adoption of a land use ordinance that requires 10% or more of new residential development in a residential zone be dedicated to moderate income housing;
